SUGGESTIONS FOR NEW HOME SCHOOLERS: a Practical Approach

I. WHAT DO I NEED TO DO FIRST IN GETTING STARTED?

In order to home school in Georgia, you must have a high school diploma or a GED. If you decide to hire someone to tutor your children, they must also have a high school diploma or GED. You should go to <u>www.ghea.org</u> (the website for the Georgia Home Education Association) and click the link on the "Getting Started" page. Follow the directions on that page. <u>NOTE:</u> <u>YOU SHOULD NOT REPORT CHILDREN UNDER SIX (6) YEARS OF AGE UNLESS THEY HAVE</u> <u>PREVIOUSLY BEEN ENROLLED IN A PUBLIC SCHOOL FOR AT LEAST 20 DAYS.</u> Fill out the Letter of Intent, submit it, then remember to print it out BEFORE you leave the Department of Education page. This form

should be submitted by September 1st or within 30 days of the establishment of your home school program. Because of the requirement of school officials to report children as truant after 10 days absence, we recommend that you submit this form as soon as you withdraw your children, although legally you have 30 days.

Do NOT call the county school board. They are elected officials and know nothing about home schooling unless they themselves have home schooled their children.

Other Suggestions:

- If you are beginning your home school program after Sept. 1, your beginning date will be the day after you withdrew your children from school and the ending date will be the day before that the following year. I realize this is as clear as mud, but that's the way it is!
- Remember to keep these forms in your file as part of your permanent records.
- Keep these documents in your files for at least three (3) years. I recommend that you keep them until they graduate!!

II. WHAT DO I NEED TO KEEP?

Keep the following records for your use only. DO NOT send in:

- Testing and test scores (Iowa Tests, Stanford Achievement or any achievement tests) at least three (3) years or until they graduate!
- End of year reports listing the subjects taught, materials used and an evaluation of that work.
- Daily lesson plans, yearly goals, your reason to home school
- Records of educational activities (field trips, art, music, etc.)
- Permanent folder for each child, including school records, attendance, health records, samples of work, extra-curricular classes attended, etc.)
- Pictures of major projects too big to keep.
- Awards

- Home schoolers are required to begin testing in 3rd grade and continue every three years following (6th, 9th, 12th). We recommend that you don't begin testing UNTIL 3rd grade.
